UPDATE

Preparation for Higher Education Programme at UCL

Our partner University College London (UCL) Institute of Education (IoE) has continued to deliver ReConnect's Higher Preparation Education programme since 2018.

26 Refugees and asylum seekers from 11 countries, 14 females and 12 males, are currently attending the Summer 2023 Term.

Since the programme started in September 2018, a total of 251 refugees and asylum seekers, 138 females and 113 males, from 34 countries, have been supported on the programme.

Educational Counselling & Credit Transfer Information Services (ECCTIS)

Since the initiative started, in June 2021, we have supported 83 (42 females and 41 males) refugees and asylum seekers from 22 countries to secure authoritative Statements of Comparability of their overseas qualifications from ECCTIS (formerly NARIC), enabling them to make an informed decision on their preferred options in higher education.

Pathways into Teaching Refugees Programme at IOE

We are currently actively seeking to raise the required funds to restore the programme.

Since 2005, In partnership with Birkbeck and the Institute of Education, ReConnect has enabled 59 (33 males. females) unemployed and underemployed refugees, from 20 countries teaching to gain qualifications.

An Impact Survey Report of the 59 refugees supported by Reconnect on a PGCE programme, undertaken by Zhen Yang, a PhD student at University of Warwick will be available shortly.

A SUCCESS STORY

CHALLENGE/

Ismail is a seasoned policy maker and mining engineer from Afghanistan who worked as a Senior Mining and Energy specialist in the Administrative Office of the President of the Islamic Republic of Afghanistan. Afghanistan is rich with untapped mining deposits, e.g., coal, gold, and Ismail did detailed work with exploration companies, and contributed to the national mineral portfolio. This work ended after the collapse of the democratic government in August 2021; the Taliban government took control.

It was devastating for Ismail to leave his homeland but having worked with representatives of the UK government (part of the UK aid programme), he and his family were able to settle in UK under ARAP (Afghan Relocation Assistance Policy). This immediately gave him the right to work, and he found a part time job. Whilst staying in a hotel he was helped by Home Office officials and a job coach/education adviser, who told him about the ReConnect 'Preparation for Higher Education' course and put him in touch with Theodros. This course oriented him into the higher education system in the UK, and developed his study skills, academic writing etc. He is very grateful to ReConnect and the tutors at the Institute of Education, who helped him find his next step. Also very grateful to his Buddy/ Mentor, Professor Izzat Darwish/ UCL.

Ismail and his family are living in London, and he is following a Master's degree in Energy, Technology and Public Policy, at University College London. He described this course as bringing together the skills of developing public policy, with scientific and technical knowledge.

Ismail is supported by a Warm Welcome scholarship, funded by the UK government Department of Education, to support people in UK, with links to Afghanistan, to access higher education.

He is enjoying the course but is aware that the future is uncertain, and there is little chance of an inclusive government in Afghanistan, which he would be able to work for.

ReConnect continues to develop, and our link with the Institute of Education goes from strength to strength. The tutors and our Director work closely together, enabling course participants to maximise the opportunity of the 10 week course: orientation to higher education in the UK, strengthening study and language skills, collaborative working with colleagues, and planning their next step.

Alan Phillips

Staff and Trustees at ReConnect were sad to learn of the recent death of Alan Phillips. There is a direct connection between Alan and the work of ReConnect. As General Secretary of World University Service (WUS UK) between 1973 and 1981, Alan's commitment to human rights, and



to supporting students and academics who were persecuted for their beliefs, and his leadership and fundraising ability, created opportunities for those in exile. Following the overthrow of the democratically elected government in Chile by the Pinochet regime in 1973, he persuaded the UK government to create scholarships for Chilean academics and students who were being persecuted in Chile. Scholarship programmes for refugees from Uganda, Ethiopia and Eritrea followed, and educational support to refugees in Southern Africa, Sudan and Nicaragua. Later Alan led work at the British Refugee Council, Minority Rights Group International, and for the Council of Europe, concerning the protection of minorities. I feel privileged to have worked in the Africa section at WUS UK, where I met our director and two trustees, who were all beneficiaries.

In later years he set up a WUS UK website https://wus.org.uk/; jointly organised the preparation of a book '100 Years: World University Service International 1920-2020' (see website); and linked ReConnect and Warwick University. Funding was secured for a PhD programme comparing support to refugee students through WUS with the work of ReConnect. Zhen Yang is the researcher, who will speak at our Refugee Week event on 19th June.
